The April 4th meeting will present a really interesting program: Kevin Johnson, Bloomfield resident, will provide a fascinating Civil War re-enactment.

Thanks to the local publications for spreading the word — the <u>Bloomfield</u>
<u>Journal</u> and the <u>Hartford Courant</u> — I trust our members are aware that in February, the \$18,000, which had been requested to repair the Southwest District School with a grant from the Connecticut Historical Commission, was voted by the Connecticut Bond Commission. It now should be possible for a permanent, rather than a temporary, roof to be put on.

Also, through the efforts of dedicated committee members, the remainder of the papers necessary to secure the \$200,000 Urban Renewal grant will be filed.

The Old Farm School soon will be open, and Mary Murphy needs docents! For all the projects, we always appreciate everyone's help and are always in need of extra hands.

I noted that the recent Connecticut Humanities Council calendar mentioned Judi Sitkin's Historic Bloomfield Bicycle Tour. She is also working with the Bloomfield schools through her Education Committee. More about this and more at the April 4th meeting. We hope to see everyone there!

The Grant House and Gardens Open House on June 3, 2001

The Wintonbury Historical Society invites you to a Gala Reception and Tour of THE GRANT HOUSE AND GARDENS at 77 Maple Avenue, Bloomfield. Don and Jan Baker, current owners, have offered the use of their house for a fund raising party for the Filley House Restoration Fund. The event is on Sunday, June 3, 2001 from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. Tickets are \$25 per person and will include a tour of the house and gardens and champagne, wine and hors d'oeuvres. Tickets will go on sale about April 1 and will be available at the April meeting. Members will be asked to sell extra tickets if they are able to do so.

In 1723, a saltbox was built at what is now 77 Maple Avenue. In 1823 a traprock house was added to the saltbox as a wedding gift to David W. Grant who was originally from Franklin, Pennsylvania. The stone house was built in the Greek revival style. The stone foundation is over three feet thick and the first and second story walls are two feet thick, narrowing to 15" in the attic. The house has a number of distinctive architectural features including the large leaded fan window on the front gable, high ceilings with wide plaster moldings, pocket doors and floor to ceiling windows in the front rooms. The original seven room were heated by six stoves placed directly in front of the wooden mantels. Captain David Grant organized and was first president of Hartford County Mutual Fire Insurance Company. He was a member of the legislature in 1814, State Senator and Moderator of the first Town Meeting in 1835. In 1829 Captain Grant agreed that his house would be a work house to send "poor idle persons to" and Grant agreed not to charge more than one dollar per week per person; until another house could be appointed by the town.

Taking care of the town's poor was one of the first steps in the process of establishing Bloomfield as a town. In 1843 this house and the land around were sold to Martin Burr, Jr. It remained in the Burr family until Ida J. Burr married George Franklin Humphrey of Canton and settled at the Grant/Burr farm. Their son George Harold Humphrey, who married Bertha Gerris of Simsbury Road, lived here his entire life until 1969, running the farm as a dairy business. Their two children, George F. Humphrey and Elaine Humphrey Meader, were well known in Bloomfield. In 1935 and still lacking indoor plumbing, the home underwent a major renovation. The old saltbox was razed and on its foundation was built a replacement seven room addition incorporating paneling, hinges, doors, the corner cupboard and other architectural materials of the original 1723 saltbox. The next owners were the Sayers in 1970 and the current owners, the Bakers, have lived there since 1984. The Bakers have updated the 1935 portion of the house and done extensive landscaping.

This event is a wonderful opportunity to see a beautiful historic home in our midst and to benefit the restoration fund of the Filley House. Those of you who heard the WHS program on traprock houses will be especially pleased to see the details of a traprock house.

Eloise Marinos, restoration architect for the Filley House project, will be our guest to answer any questions you may have about that project.
